

Great NYS Fair Provides Perfect Venue for Great Shipwrecks of NY's "Great" Lakes Exhibit

New York's freshwaters hold fascinating shipwrecks spanning three centuries. The 2014 Great New York State Fair which drew nearly one million visitors provided a spotlight venue for showcasing these recreational and tourism treasures, and more!

NYSG Responds

New York Sea Grant, in partnership with the Great New York State Fair, Great Lakes Research Consortium (GLRC), Great Lakes Seaway Trail, and others, created The Great Shipwrecks of NY's Great Lakes Signature Exhibit that was set in the mini-NY State Park with access to its reflecting pool at the Fair.

The exhibit filled a 60-foot tent with interpretive panels, photos, video, and artifacts of shipwrecks in Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, Lake George, Lake Champlain, Finger Lakes, and the St. Lawrence River.

Manniquins sported three decades of scuba diving gear. Visitors inspected a French and Indian War-era bateau replica. The 2014 Discover Clean and Safe Boating campaign mouseboat displayed all the gear required for clean, safe and legal boating on NY waters, while Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers displays educated viewers about slowing the spread of unwanted invasive species.

Children dug into a "treasure chest" for small prizes. U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary mascot Coastie, the "talking tugboat," was a hit with all ages and viewers of News Channel 9's Bridge Street show.

A seven-foot-long sturgeon mount joined the exhibit in the second week of the 12-day event. Cornell Fisheries Biologist Tom Brooking, a NY Sturgeon for Tomorrow volunteer, commented, "Being part of this exhibit is a wonderful opportunity to educate the public about New York State Department of Environmental Conservation efforts to re-establish the fish in such numbers that it can be removed from Threatened and Endangered Species lists."

An underwater ROV (remotely-operated vehicle) was built on site; daily demonstratons located "sunken" items in the pool. Weather watchers enjoyed the GLRC's floating 24/7 data-sensing buoy.
