I FISH NY is an aquatic stewardship program that uses fishing to connect people to their local aquatic environment. We reach our participants through school programs, public clinics, and professional development. All our programs are free, including bait and tackle.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Classroom Visits

School programs are open to grades 3 through high school. During two class-room visits (45–50 minute sessions), students receive fish-related lessons in preparation for the fishing trip. Older students explore more advanced topics, e.g. fisheries management. Lessons can often be fit into a lab period.

All lessons meet NYC and NYS Department of Education standards.

Elementary school topics: Fish anatomy Camouflage Local species diversity Aquatic food web

Middle and high school topics: Fisheries management Population estimation Local fish consumption advisories Invasive species



We know people learn better when they are having fun. During one of our class-room visits, students play a biodiversity game called Go Fish! that features local fish species.

Fishing Trips

Following the in-class visits, students go on a fishing trip at their closest water-body where they learn how to fish safely and effectively.

School Responsibilities Provide a 1:5 adult chaperone to student ratio.
